In May of 1941 the Japanese Imperial Army occupied the Philippines and captured Manila the capital. It is estimated that the Japanese captured at least 53,000 American and Filipino fighting men during the entire campaign in the Philippines. This figure includes approximately 20,000 American soldiers, sailors and marines, 12,000 Filipino scouts, and 21,000 soldiers of the Filipino Commonwealth Army. The Japanese military took control of the Philippine postal service and a series of stamps and stationary were issued during the Japanese occupation. The Scott Catalogue US Specialized lists N1 – N39 and Occupation postal Cards UUX1 – NUX3.

The first day cover shown below was posted on Dec 8 1942 the first day of issue of the Greater East Asia War, Scott # N9 and celebrates the Japanese victory on Bataan and Corregidor. The cover has a cachet celebrating the victory as well as well as a Japanese Military purple censor marking. Note that the stamp is a reissue of Philippines Scott # 384 the 4 centavo yellow green stamp of 1935. Note that the occupation stamp has the United States of America blacked out with a horizontal bar and overprinted with the 1st Anniversary of Greater East Asia War. The stamp was revalued to 5 centavos. The second FDC is NUX2 a 2 centavo occupation postal card, an overprinted UZ4 official postal card originally issued in 1941. Note that various horizontal and vertical bars obliterate any reference to Commonwealth or United States. Also obliterated was the OB (Official Business) reference on the original card. This card also illustrates the purple Japanese passed by censor marking.
